

Spring 2024 – Garden Spotlight: Appreciating the Poetry of Patience

hough the days are consistently growing longer, the time between celebrating the new year and searching for signs of new life are, arguably, the most grueling even with the benefit of the shortest month.

There's a saying that "Winter is the poetry of patience." Poetry, often symbolic and sometimes quite cryptic, requires patience and persistence of its readers, but it can create powerful, beautiful environments and experiences that are otherwise difficult to put into words. Similarly, winter demands our patience and persistence and can create powerful, beautiful environments and experiences that are not possible during other times of the year. Though it can be frustrating, there is a definite connection between winter and wonder.

Even without a blanket, or even a dusting, of snow, the world looks different in winter. It's calmer, colder, slower, simpler. Some look forward to savoring the silence and the slowed pace. Others anxiously count the seconds of increased sunlight as soon as we observe the winter solstice.

Since the new year, many have been pinpointing or practicing resolutions and intentions often focused on personal growth. Eating healthier. Exercising more. Behaving more kindly to others—and ourselves. Finding new hobbies. We've been sliding into a kind of growth mindset even though the world around us is very much still still, unmoving, asleep.

Patience can be a challenge

Practicing patience in the waning days of winter can become a significant challenge. Even for those who enjoy it, winter carries with it a kind of tension between standing still and finding movement, between resting and regenerating. This tension is especially difficult when we've created rituals focused on planning for what's next, heightening the anticipation of what is yet to come.

But, there's another saying, "good things come to those who wait." And practicing patience in waning-winter is always rewarded with welcoming the waxing signs of spring.

However, for spring to do its thing, we need the cold, damp, darkness of winter to soak and chill us to our cores. This is especially true for many of the plants and flowers we associate as symbols of spring's rebirth and renewal.

For animals, such a process of slowing down and allowing ourselves to submit to winter's whims is commonly called hibernation – "a state of minimal activity and metabolic depression and seasonal lower-body temperatures undergone by some animal species." While people don't adhere to this exact definition of hibernation, we certainly do find ourselves slowing down for one reason or another.

This process for plants is called stratification, which is a horticultural term describing the cold, moist period that occurs over winter when seeds are dormant until conditions become more ideal for germination in the spring when warmth and

light return. Stratification is especially important for perennial plants that follow seasonal cycles, returning to grow and blossom year after year.

We need winter to slow us down so we can practice patience and to better appreciate the bounty and blessings of spring—to give us time to recharge for the journey and joys of the new year.

Spring bulbs are doing their thing in winter

Fellows Riverside Gardens is a perfect place to practice patience and rejoice in spring's rejuvenating jubilee. Hundreds of brilliant white snowdrops and vibrant violet crocuses will start the waves of spring's colorful chorus: orange and yellow daffodils, red and purple tulips, pink apple blossoms, and green shoots of all shapes, shades, and sizes. All of these spring beauties need the harsh touch of winter: The ideal timeline and temperature range for most spring-blooming bulbs is 10-14 weeks at 35 to 45°F. When these bulbs are exposed to cold temperatures, it initiates a chemical conversation that tells the bulb to "turn on" flower formation and signals root growth to begin.

And before we know it, spring will be in full bloom with all the familiar sights, sounds, smells, and activities that come back every year like long-time friends returning home to visit.

The much anticipated and beloved Friends of Fellows Riverside Gardens Plant Sale will also be returning this year to once again help us get into the swing of spring.

During the weeks of waning winter while we are growing in our want of spring, practice patience. The warmth of springtime's sun is coming, illuminating all the bright, brilliance of new life. And with it, hopefully a deeper appreciation of the subtle, essential, poetry of winter.

Winter events despite the chill

While winter's chill is still with us, there are some indoor ways to stay in touch with the outside world. Visit the Davis Center to see "A Brush with Nature," a watercolor exhibit featuring works from members of the Mahoning Valley Watercolor Society located in the Weller Gallery. The education department at Mill Creek Metroparks is hosting "Winter Talks," a lecture series running through February, which are located at the Ford Nature Center. Topics include: Stories of Mill Creek Park, The History & Geology of Lanterman's Mill, Backyard Birds & the Upcoming Backyard Bird Count, the History of the Mahoning River, Frozen Ecosystems, Forest Therapy: Reconnecting with Nature, Winter Wanders & Writing, and Winter Sky Talk.

And stay tuned for information about upcoming events and speakers supported through the Andrews Horticulture Education Program, which will likely be hosted at the Davis Center.

your garden beds. In addition, master gardener volunteers will be on hand to answer all your gardening questions. We will also have some plants in decorative pots chosen by our Shop Buyer Jeanne Simeone to give as gifts to your favorite mom or for your own patio or deck.

In the early Fall (dates TBD) we will again have our popular mum and bulb sales. Dates will be announced in next newsletter, in email blasts to our members, on our website and posted on Facebook.

We would like to acknowledge and thank Joe Tucker, Garden Supervisor,

and Marcy Dubec, Gardener, and all of our dedicated volunteers as these sales would not be possible without their dedication, partnership and support.

Cash and credit cards will be accepted at all sales. Members of Friends of Fellows receive a 10% discount on plant sales items purchased as well as any purchases at the Shop at the Gardens.

The Friends Plant Sale and How it Grew

he Annual Plant Sale at Fellows Riverside Gardens has long been a welcome sign of spring. The early Sales were held on the North Terrace overlooking the city. Gordon Vujevic chaired the first Sale in 1990; Judy Fleming, the second. The primary purpose of the early Sales was to draw visitors to the Gardens, though fundraising by Friends was also crucial.

The Sale grew in popularity each year, and so did its offerings – an amazing array of perennials, flowering bushes and small trees, roses and herbs and dahlias and every color of annual. Aquatic plants were sold one year, Dawn Redwoods another. Shoppers were attracted not just to the abundance and variety of plants; they also came for the gardening wisdom of the volunteers who staffed the Sale, mostly graduates of the Gardens' Master Gardener program. The Gardens staff also pitched in with advice and support.

Sara Scudier, chair for more than two decades, recalls that the Sale spanned 3 days once the new Davis Center and parking lot were completed in 2001, providing ample space for tents, tables, shopping carts and parking. Held in early May, the Sale would sometimes experience surprise snows, rainstorms, and even hailstones! Spring sunshine and good shopping weather would always return, though.

Volunteers specialized in types of plants, becoming expert in cultivar trends and nursery sources. Late winter in the greenhouses (built with the financial support of Friends plant sales), a small crew would plant trays of tomato and pepper and other vegetable seeds, tending to them for weeks as they grew sturdy and ready for home garden planting.

Another team of volunteers would start seeds for annual vines in March – cardinal climber and cypress vine for hummingbirds, hyacinth bean and cup-and-saucer vines for dramatic color, climbing sweet peas and nasturtium for their scent. Sunflowers became a favorite greenhouse-grown plant.

COVID caused a pause and then a careful return, with chair Deb Metzger guiding a series of smaller sales that end with bulbs and volunteer-grown mums sold in the fall.

A multitude of flowers, helpful volunteers, and eager plant lovers – what a combination! It has made possible more than 30 years of fundraising for the Gardens by Friends. Thanks to all!

Friends Presents \$95K Gift to MetroParks from Davis Endowment by Jim Houck

A group of Friends board members attended the Mill Creek MetroParks board of commissioners meeting in December to present a check for just over \$95,000.

The funds are from the D.D. and Velma Davis Education and Visitor Center Permanent Endowment Trust Agreement. In a typical year, the income generated from the fund is paid to Friends for the purpose of defraying the expense, providing maintenance, and funding improvements to the Davis Center facility.

Past practice has been for the MetroParks to request these endowment funds to cover costs of distinct needs outside of the operating budget or to fund special projects meant to improve the facility.

Last year, for example, funds were used to pay for canopies and outdoor furniture to improve the café terrace.

This year's request from the MetroParks was for Davis Education and Visitor Center maintenance and repairs.


